CEN ISO Standard on Cocoa, a tool to support the professionalization of cocoa farming

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Why

• The standard was developed by stakeholders across the entire cocoa supply chain who want to make sustainable cocoa production the norm and a viable option for as many cocoa farmers as possible and to secure the global supply of cocoa.

How

- Through active participation by all stakeholders in countries that are involved in the drafting process, including countries representing more than 95% of all cocoa produced and the main consuming countries in EU and USA.
- Public enquiry starting September 1st, so everybody else can participate as well



What

- requirements for sustainable and traceable cocoa, including economic, social and environmental factors
- a tool to support the professionalization of cocoa farming.

- adoption of the requirements will enable farmer organizations to deliver targeted services to their farmer members, assisting them to transform their farms into economically viable units

- requirements for Good Agricultural Practice (GAP) and improved business methods.

- commitment to a farm development plan. This process will assist farmers in planning a sustainable future for their cocoa farms.



What more?

- Strict requirements for improved working and social conditions for farmers and their families, including children.
- The empowerment of women and young people and is a tool to improve gender equality and equal opportunities that will support improved social conditions.
- Environmental protection requirements to preserve natural resources and biodiversity and to avoid pollution.



Anything else?

- A standard for traceability, including systems for identity preserved, segregation and very strict rules for mass balance.
- Rules for conformity assessment based on ISO standards but translated to the world of cocoa.
- Rules for organizations that want to apply the standard.
- A technical guidance document.



For who?

 Worldwide, more than 14 million farmers grow cocoa, of which 10.5 million are in Africa.

The standard is designed to be broadly accessible for cocoa farmers wherever they live. There is a low threshold to entry – any cocoa farmer who can meet the criteria may choose to operate under the standard.

 The standard includes conditions to be fulfilled by both, farmers and farmer organizations as well as all stakeholders in the supply chain for traceability.



When?

• The standard will be published at the end of 2017.

Where?

• It is a voluntary standard. It is applicable worldwide, wherever buyers and sellers agree.
